## From the East

Brothers, we are doing a great job sticking to our plan. I am very proud of the officers and key leaders this year and you should be, too. We are staying on track to meet our monthly goals in all areas. Our monthly officer meetings are proving to be an effective tool for keeping everyone working together and helping to streamline our stated communications. The officers and key leaders focus this month is preparation for the Master Mason Degree and Blood Drive in May, and preparation for the Table Lodge in June. This month there are two things that you can do to help you Lodge, and we really need your help; to attend the stated meeting and to participate in the Lodge Clean-Up Day & Lodge Breakfast on Saturday April 23. We will be having many visitors from the community visiting our Lodge in May so attending the meeting in April will help to restrengthen Fraternal bonds and give you more information to help know how to assist in the cleaning the Lodge to ensure that it puts its best foot forward when we have visitors in May.

Education focus for April:

We our focusing our Masonic education efforts in April on "Logic and Freemasonry". Logic is defined as a science that deals with the principles of validity of inference and demonstration. In other words, it is analytical reasoning. It builds on the understanding of Grammar and Rhetoric and helps you to sort through what is being said or written and examine truths without becoming caught up in emotion-based rhetoric or ideas. It is a tool that you can use to help you keep irregular passions within due bounds and to conquer inner ruffians, but rather identify truths that can help you along your journey. Here are two examples of how Logic can be used to watch out for.

1. "Biscuits and gravy are better than heaven." The bad logic used to support the statement is: "Biscuits and gravy are better than nothing. Nothing is better than heaven, so biscuits and gravy must be better than heaven."
2. All Shriners are Masons. Brother Jones. is a Shriner, so Brother Jones must be a Mason. This is deductive reasoning which can be an effective way to use logic.

These two fun examples are meant to illustrate the importance of understanding Logic and that it has an application for Masons. Right Worshipful Rhey Solomon has an excellent program developed on this topic for our April stated communication. He is a professor at John Hopkins University and has taught logic there for numerous years and is excited to show us some great applications of Freemasonry and Logic.

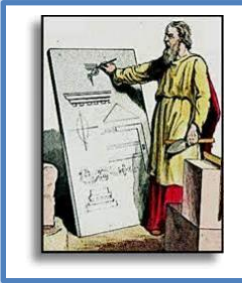

### JUNIOR WARDEN

As nicer weather approaches many of us will begin to start beautifying our homes with various projects. To include landscaping, mulching, trimming, a fresh coat of paint to our shed or deck, etc. Our Fraternal Home should also be included in our plans for Spring beautification. As we all have obligations outside of our Fraternity, I ask only a small fraction of your time. The 24-inch gauge has taught us to measure our time accordingly so keeping that in mind I would ask that we commit to the late morning/early afternoon of Saturday the 23rd of April. The time commitment would be no more than a couple of hours. The goal would be to do a cleaning of the Lodge interior and attend to any minor exterior issues ie: weeds, trimming any low hanging branches, etc. Notating any issues with the siding, roof, deck, and formulating a plan of action for items requiring our attention. If the weather doesn't cooperate with us, we can exclude any exterior work for another time.

Here are some tips to keep the Brethren safe during our clean-up day and also in general when working around the house!

Dress for yard cleaning:

- Wear protective footwear. Wear shoes or boots, not sandals, to protect your toes.
- Wear properly fitting gloves. This improves your grip on tools and also help keeps skin safe from blisters, sunburn, bug bites, poisonous plants and chemicals.
- Wear hearing protection when using loud equipment.
- Wear safety glasses to keep flying objects out of your eyes.
- Apply bug spray to keep pests away. Shower after use to remove the chemicals from your skin. And while you're at it, take a minute to look for ticks. If you find one, gently pull it out with tweezers.
- Apply sunscreen or skin products with SPF to any exposed skin to prevent sunburn. Don't be fooled by cloudy days; you can still get a sunburn.

Work smart

- Stretch your body. Take time to stretch and warm up before the work begins. Weeding, trimming and raking are repetitive motions – change your posture or stance every few minutes and switch activities every 30 minutes.

- Lift things carefully and safely. Lift properly by bending at the knees and hips and using leg power rather than bending at the waist and putting the strain on your back. Instead of carrying heavy or unwieldy loads, employ a cart or wheelbarrow.
- Drink water and take breaks in the shade. Even if it's not hot or humid, yard work is exercise, and staying hydrated is important to avoid heat related illness.
- Don't use power tools under the influence. The same rules that apply to vehicles apply to power tools, including lawn mowers. Say no to distractions and anything that might cloud judgment.
- Ready the tools
- Familiarize yourself with power tools and how they work. Read owner's manuals (many are available online) and know about various switches, modes and required maintenance.
- Check cords on tools and extension cords. Look for cuts, cracks and frayed wires and do not use them if damaged. Also check the label to make sure you don't use an indoor extension cord outside.
- Make sure tools are in the "off" position before plugging them in or unplugging.
- Use ladders safely. Set ladders on a firm, level surface; never stand on one of the top three rungs; and use a utility belt to hold tools so you can properly climb facing the ladder.
- Call 811 before you dig. This notifies local utilities to check your property before you plant a tree, dig a trench or set fence posts.

Protect loved ones

- Watch out for children and pets. Be sure children and pets are inside (or well supervised if out) while you work.
- Securely store tools and equipment. Store sharp tools, weed killer, fertilizer and other dangerous items in a locked cabinet out of reach of curious hands and mouths.
- Educate and supervise kids with equipment. Before allowing any child to operate a mower, sound judgment, strength, coordination and maturity are necessary. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that children should have these characteristics and be at least 12 years old before operating any type of mower – and at least 16 years old to operate a riding mower.

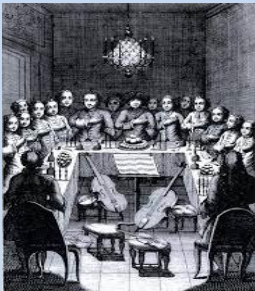
## Masonic Symbolism Studies

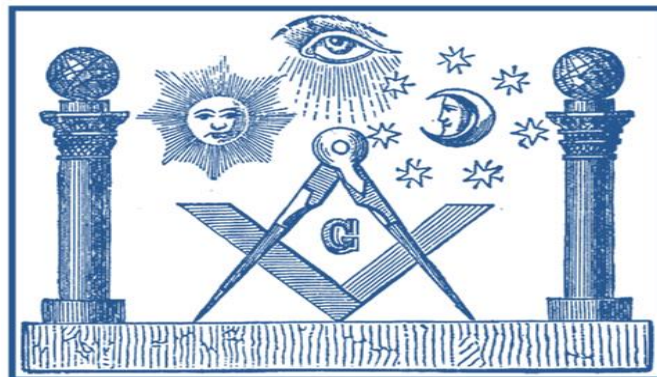


